## DHS CLASS HIGHLIGHT INTRO TO TEACHING



Danville High School's Introduction to Teaching course is geared towards those students interested in pursuing a career in education. It is taught by Mr. David Covey, who also teaches World History. Mr. Covey has been teaching at Danville High School for 17 years. He went to the University of Illinois and earned a Bachelor's in History. However, teaching was not his first desire. "I initially planned to go to law school but instead I went to Illinois State University and earned a Bachelors in education."

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Former superintendent, Mr. Denman, and Mr. Neil, former DHS principal, requested that Mr. Covey begin a course for kids interested in the educational field. The class teaches the social skills and discusses the challenges teachers face in the classroom every day. This class is designed to answer the question, "Is teaching really for me?" A substantial part of this class takes place off-campus at a District 118 Elementary or Middle school. Students in Intro to Teaching are given the opportunity to observe and co-teach with a District 118 teacher.

Students interested in a career in education and teaching should consider taking this course. Mr Covey explains, "This gives students a class that they will never take in college, but it gets them thinking about what kind of teacher they want to be, how they would teach a class, and how they will relate to their



students." Alexander Coast is a student currently enrolled in the class. He plans on going to college to become a music teacher. Alex stated in our interview, "I like how Mr. Covey cultivates an environment that encourages us to be completely honest with ourselves and our classmates. I am looking forward to being pushed out of my comfort zone and learning more about myself."

In the upcoming months, students will be setting their schedules for the 2024-2025 school year. If any current junior, with a GPA of 2.0 or higher, is interested in taking the class next year and have any questions or concerns, talk to your assigned counselor and or Mr. Covey.

## MLK SCHOLARSHIP WINNER **DAVARI BOYD** DHS SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION AND UPDATES

Each year, Danville High School, members of the community, and the DHS School Counselors put out a number of scholarship opportunities for graduating Seniors. If you are a Senior and looking to get some help financially to pay for college, there are fifteen scholarships currently listed on the DHS Scholarship Opportunities spreadsheet. Numerous others will be added in the coming weeks. Each year, approximately \$85,000 worth of scholarships are awarded to DHS students, with amounts ranging from \$75.00 all the way up to several thousand, per scholarship.

Scholarships are an incredible source of financial assistance for future college students, but they take a lot of work. Although the money is not guaranteed, following these tips may help you earn the chance of being awarded thousands of dollars which will be applied to your school:

- 1. Create a resume that can be included in your materials for all scholarship applications.
- 2. Be sure to check the scholarship spreadsheet regularly, and print all applications. If filling applications out by hand is the only option, make sure your penmanship is neat.
- 3. Acknowledge that application completion will take some dedicated, focused time and make it a point to clear your schedule to make this happen.
- 4. Create a working copy of the DHS Scholarship Opportunities 2024 Google spreadsheet—eliminate the scholarships you do not qualify for and keep the scholarships that you do. Doing this will make the spreadsheet (and the task) less overwhelming.
- 5. Advocate for yourself, especially at this stage in life—when you are preparing to venture on to college.

One of the largest local scholarships available is the Martin Luther King Scholarship. The scholarship requires students to be active in a religious institution, submit a letter from their pastor, provide financial information about their parent or guardian, submit several letters of recommendation, and write an essay based on Dr. King's, "I Have a Dream" speech. The MLK Committee determines the winner, who is awarded \$4,000 total, \$2,000 for two years. The scholarship may be used for tuition, books, and fees related to their education.

This year, Mr. Groves and Ms. Woods held multiple scholarship workshops, where students could establish a game plan on how to navigate this labor intensive application process. Groves said, "As the recipient of the 2010 MLK Scholarship and a long-time supporter, I wanted to ensure that students turned their passion into writing. After helping with submissions over the past two years, I considered it an honor to assist with the scholarships, and I look forward to more opportunities to come. The benefits are simple: We help students follow the guidelines, assist with an outline for the scholarship, and ensure everything is ready to help students. After years on the Higher Education side, I learned that the best scholarship essays involved students writing from a personal perspective and finding a way to turn their passion into writing. I aim to discover a student's story, assist in a game plan, and allow them to soar in their writing." The DHS College and Career Lab will also continue to be a great resource for those interested in the college scholarship or application process.

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This year's MLK Scholarship winner was Davari Boyd. What allowed Davari's essay to stand out was the fact that he stuck to the essay prompt and related Dr. King's dream to his personal life. In scholarships, many miss out on opportunities due to needing to follow each established rule. Davari wrote two essays during his workshop time with Mr. Groves; one was a personal statement, and the second was the scholarship essay that won. Mr. Groves said, "Although the personal statement was great, it needed to answer the prompt chosen. After discussion and deliberation, we created a new outline and he wrote the winning essay. "

## FOOTBALL FIELD RENOVATION UPDATES

The bleachers at Ned Whitesell Field have been standing for 99 years. Gradually, these bleachers have crumbled over time and, by now, have become a huge safety concern for the students and community. To combat this, construction has begun for a complete renovation of Ned Whitesell Field.

The focal point of the project is to improve conditions, ensuring the safety of those attending any event at the Ned Whitesell Field. Due to the terrible state of the bleachers, if this construction had not begun in the next year or two, Ned Whitesell field most likely would not have been able to be preserved any longer. This is important to note, considering the backlash from some Danville citizens concerning the project's price. Not only is two-thirds of the cost of this project solely the bleachers, but it is also the last renovation to be prioritized in Danville District 118, as there are currently renovations being made at Northeast, KDBA, new mechanicals being added at North Ride, South View, and Mark Denman, while new boilers and chillers have been installed at Danville High School and Southwest Elementary. Fortunately, following the pandemic, ESSER (Elementary and Secondary School Relief) funds became available and have been able to finance many of these projects, which has allowed for more leeway to use the district's capital funding for the renovations going on at Danville High School such as the new sports complex, the library, and some classrooms.

Beyond the bleachers, many more additions are coming to Ned Whitesell Field. Some of These additions include a new concrete walkway to compliment the bleachers, new player tunnels, which are a staple for Ned Whitesell field, field turf that is designed for football and soccer, new goalposts, new LED lighting, a new scoreboard that features instant replay, a new press box with built-in cameras that encapsulate the entire field, a media center for football which will be acclimated with heating and air, and a new sound system. Adding turf is a significant change, considering that the Ned Whitesell field has always been grass. Regardless, it seems a promising choice, especially for its all-weather and multipurpose usage. The turf being installed is a proprietary turf that includes a cooling agent to regulate temperatures so that it doesn't ever get too hot for athletes to play on, it has a longevity factor and is considered college-level turf. Another huge positive aspect of this renovation is that it will be handicap accessible because previously, it was difficult for handicapped people to get in and out of the complex. Additionally, there will be handicapped seating in the first and last rows of the bleachers which will have seatbacks.

These changes coming to Danville High School are pivotal in increasing the community's morale. Danville High School is a hub for the surrounding areas and hosts a number of events for for other schools in the district and even events for Danville Area Community College. Since so many people are coming in and out of Danville High for different reasons, its qualities must emit positive energy. As conditions steadily improve at Danville High School and other schools in the community, Danville High will continue to be where people want to be, and its features will represent the good things Danville has going for it.

While the new changes will be remarkable, this part of the renovation is only considered phase one. Expansions for the future include an addition to the current fieldhouse, which will include new restrooms, a concession stand, and a new weight room. There are also thoughts for a wrestling room and even an archery room, as it continues to gain popularity at Danville High. Current renovations are projected to be done by the end of August as long as weather permits, hopefully for Danville High's week one football game against Bloomington High School.





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## NEW TRADITION **COCOA COTILLION**

On Friday, January 26th, the Future Problem Solvers (FPS) began a new tradition: the Winter Cocoa Cotillion. The event was originally planned for Saturday, January 20th, but due to the water issues in the community and severe winter weather, it was postponed to January 26th. The idea for the cotillion was created by FPS members, along with Ms. Woods as a way to recognize Winter Athletes, host a Winter dance, and honor students who provide service to their community.

FPS kicked off the week with spirit week dress days which all revolved around the theme: Dancing Through the Decades. Monday's theme was Salad Dressing Day, this included many dress up options such as: House Dressing (pajamas), Thousand Island (Hawaiian), Ranch (cowboy/rancher), and Caesar (togas). Tuesday's theme was Country vs. Country Club, which allowed students to dress like a cowboy or preppy. Wednesday's theme was College or Career Bound Day. Thursday's theme was Athlete vs. Mathlete. Friday's theme was Maroon and White, which coincided with an all school assembly in the Gym.

In the weeks leading up to the event, staff and students were encouraged to vote for students who show service to their community. This was different from prom and homecoming, as students usually make nominations for the court and are voted in based on popularity. For the cotillion, the five highest voted students in each grade were recognized and monarchs, not kings and queens, were selected by staff only. This year's Cocoa monarchs were Alex Cosat and Nia Crawford. These students both received a \$250.00 scholarship. Curtis Beasley also received a \$500.00 scholarship for the Outstanding Service Leader award, specifically for his volunteer work during his time at DHS. Samantha Brown was also recognized for her service to the community, which gives back to our local animal shelter. Samantha will be given \$100.00 to fund supplies needed for the animal shelter.

The Cocoa Cotillion event followed a home basketball game and featured snacks, a hot cocoa bar, board games, karaoke, basketball, and volleyball. It was a chance to hang out with friends in a more casual environment than homecoming or prom. Student Council member Cameron Feuerbron attended the event and enjoyed the karaoke and card games but wished more people had attended. "Unfortunately, between winter break, bad weather, and all the days out of school many students just didn't know about the event," says Feuerborn. Starting new traditions can be tough, but the Cocoa Cotillion seems promising and like an event worth celebrating in years to come.

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Before students were dismissed for Winter Break, a Staff versus Student basketball game was held in the DHS Main Gym. The final score was 36-22, in favor of the teachers. The basketball game was arranged to celebrate the 2nd Quarter PBIS Goal, which was to lower the number of students with Loitering referrals by 5% between November 1st and November 21st. The initial percentage was 27.95%, and the desired outcome was to get to 22.95%. However, the final percentage achieved ended up being around 11%, VCS which surpassed the goal significantly.

The decision to organize a Staff versus Student basketball game as a reward was made by Mr. Wright prior to the school year starting. The popularity of basketball among students and staff played a role in the choice. Several members of the PE Department, Career and Tech Ed Department, and DHS Coaches participated in the event. According to the students, the event was fun to watch and they enjoyed seeing the teachers as underdogs come out victorious. There was lots of laughter and enjoyment by all who attended. When asked about future PBIS events, the students expressed their interest in a student vs. teacher volleyball game. This shows that students enjoy these friendly competitions and would like to see more of them in the future.

The 3rd Quarter PBIS goal is to reduce the overall absentee



rate to below 10%. Currently, the rate stands at 10.30%. Although the goal doesn't seem very significant, it equates to about 160 fewer absences. To better their attendance, students can make a conscious effort to attend school regularly and prioritize their education. This includes being punctual, staying engaged in class, and seeking help when needed. If the 3rd Quarter goal is met, the Fine Arts Department will be holding a special performance during the school day for students and staff to attend.
