Friday: Pajama Day



assembly, the king and queen were crowned: Curtis Beasley IV and Nevaeh Smith.




What is the most rewarding part of your job? Watching highschoolers live the most important days of their lives, and also having the opportunity to interact with the students.


So let's remember to keep taking care of each other Vikings. You are seen. You are heard. You matter. You can do it.

Danville High School now hosts a College & Career Lab for Juniors and Seniors, located in Room #110, right by the Circle Drive Doors. Currently, the College & Career Lab space is being used for college representative visits and college prep presentations being put on by the School Counselors. Ms. Woods is hoping the use of the lab grows as the year moves forward, "We plan for the lab to be used to build resources for DHS to prepare for SAT testing, help students study for AP testing or entrance exams, complete college applications, resumes and scholarships."


The DHS Future Problem Solvers came up with the idea for the College & Career Lab last school year. They have already raised and spent over \$2,400 to

renovate the space, formerly used as a classroom. Going forward, FPS students will be helping recruit students in need of support and will be working to create materials that students will have access to. The space itself has already been showcased this fall when it was used to host the first event, Gun Violence Panel, with Congresswoman Kelly. are incredibly thankful for their dedication, as it has


been a dream in the making for some time now.

LIBRARY & SCIENCE LABS RENOVATION UPDATES

In the winter of 2022, renovations of the Danville High School library began, which created an excitement for students and staff alike. The \$8.3 million project was part of a larger renovation which included the 1972 Addition and DHS Science Laboratory spaces. DHS Students are now able to fully enjoy these newly designed spaces, featuring state of the art technology, furniture, and equipment used to enhance student learning.

Mr.Truex, District #118 Director of Buildings and Grounds, first prioritized the renovations of the library in 2015 when he began working for District #118. He and Mrs. Mary Ellen Bunton, Director of Curriculum, began researching the design for a modernized library in 2018. Mr. Truex acknowledged that, "The actual drawings, renderings, engineering, and architectural design of that project were started two years prior to the beginning of the project itself." Lots of planning and preparation went into making the space what it is today.

The renovated library is more than just a library, as expressed by Mr. Truex, "We don't really call it a library, we call it a media center." These new improvements include an E-Sports gaming room, several collaboration rooms that can be used by staff and students, multiple study areas, a podcast room, a broadcast room, an interview room, and a green screen room. Mrs. Bunton stated that the renovation provides collaborative spaces for innovative thinking but could also be a quiet environment for studying or reading, so it really is




multi-purposed. She included, "We really tried hard to think about not only what we needed for now, but what everyone would need 20 to 30 years from now."


Danville High School Librarian, Mr. Roskovensky, expressed the pros and cons of the new library as being a "new clean space." He continued by mentioning the comfortable seating and more private areas but stated that he "missed the openness of the original library." Danville High School Senior, Curtis Beasley IV, shared his perspective of the new renovations as being, "An environment that is very calm and serene, so it allows me to focus on what I need to get done." Additionally, he admires the renovated library for providing no outward distractions.

Mrs. Bunton states, "The goals we wanted to accomplish are complete but I think that we should also be forward thinking." She believes that the spaces are always evolving as education does in Danville High School. Staff and students are grateful for the thoughtful planning that went into this great modern learning space. U OF I SUMMER INTERNSHIP FOR JUNIOR MAYA HALE

MAYA HALE

My name is Maya Hale and I am currently a Junior at DHS. Last summer, I got into a competitive paid research internship at the University of Illinois - Champaign Urbana. Through this experience, I learned many valuable skills and met many wonderful people.

The program was a six-week residential opportunity where students stayed at the same dorm together and worked in multiple labs across the STEM part of campus. My lab was in the Loomis Laboratory of Physics under the Project 8 lab. Project 8 is an international project to measure the mass of a neutrino. Professor Chen-Yu Liu runs the UIUC sector of the lab and is working to create a magnetic trap that will enclose tritium atoms throughout beta minus decay to find the mass of a neutrino. My lab partner and I spent six weeks learning about the different methods of magnetic trapping and creating different pro types, one representing the method used in the Halbach Array (magnetic trap). We worked with the graduate student working in the lab, Paul Harmston.

The experience I gained from the program was unique and valuable. However, I believe the people I met were an even more valuable part of my experience. I met about twenty students with interests similar to mine, along with multiple UIUC students and faculty. Paul, the graduate student I worked with, was a fantastic mentor. For example, Paul worked with my lab partner and me while contacting other labs we were interested in working with after the program. His guidance helped me get my current internship in a different UIUC lab. Overall, this program was an irreplaceable opportunity that I am so grateful for, and I recommend it to anyone interested in STEM!

DHS CLASS HIGHLIGHT WELDING WITH WERNERT

Danville High School offers a welding class that has courses for beginners, intermediate, and advanced students. The class offers all the equipment needed to start welding and personal protective equipment. The class helps students find a new hobby in welding and opens many career paths for their future. The class is taught by Mr. Joe Wernert, who has a passion for welding and loves teaching kids the safe way to weld.



After working at Watchfire for 7 years, Mr. Wernert decided he wanted to help the younger generation get into welding. While working at Watchfire he realized not many young people were interested in welding. He knew he needed to do something about it because we need the next generation of welders.

Welding is a process that joins materials, usually metals or thermoplastics by using high heat to melt the parts together and then allowing them to cool, causing fusion. Welding is distinct from lower-temperature metal-joining techniques such as brazing and soldering which do not melt the base metal. There are many different techniques and types of welding that the class offers, all taught by Mr. Wernert.

There are many opportunities for welding, especially for young people, there is lots of room for growth in the industry. Plus, there is always a need for welders, not only in construction but in so many different industries. Many welding careers will pay really well for your skill and experience.

Lots of students enjoy the class and are learning useful skills that will actually help them with their futures. Many students who want to go into welding career paths can use the class as a way to get started. The class is not only fun and creative but also the start of many student's welding career paths.

Would you recommend this class to other students?


Yes, I would recommend this class to other students because it's fun and interesting, and there are a lot of jobs you can get for welding.

The dice project because they look nice. There are 6 of them.


In general, what have you learned while in welding?
